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

Sergey Bogza Music Director and Conductor

Pergey Bogza, described as **J**"a charismatic conductor whose passion radiates from the podium" (The Virginian-Pilot), is known for his unique approach to working with orchestras and engaging audiences on and off the podium. In his third year as the Music Director of the Panama City Symphony, he leads masterworks and holiday concerts, curates a monthly chamber music series, and serves as the Director of Music Education. In 2024, he was named the Music Director and Conductor of the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra and has made his professional debut with the Alabama Symphony Orchestra and the Alabama Ballet. Bogza has previously held Music Director roles with orchestras such as the Millikin-Decatur Symphony Orchestra, Willmar Symphony, and Heartland Symphony Orchestra.

Equally comfortable leading productions of opera, ballet, and concert repertoire, Bogza's energy and artistic integrity are highly regarded by audiences and musicians alike. He has been awarded top prizes at international conducting competitions and is an active composer of symphonic and chamber music. Combining the roles of a conductor and a composer, the premieres of his works are enthusiastically received by audiences and musical ensembles across the United States and Europe.

As a guest conductor, Bogza cultivates a burgeoning international presence that has brought him engagements in the USA and Europe with orchestras, ballet companies, and festivals. He has guest conducted musicians of the Minnesota Orchestra, Virginia Beach Symphony, Pazardzhik Symphony Orchestra, Sheboygan Symphony Orchestra, Auburn Symphony Orchestra, Illinois Valley Symphony Orchestra, and Gwinnett Symphony Orchestra. Bogza also served as an assistant conductor for Joffrey Ballet's 100-year anniversary production of The Rite of Spring, and the University of Minnesota's Benjamin Britten's Peace Project, which combined the musical talents of students from North America and Germany, culminating in the critically acclaimed performances of Benjamin Britten's War Requiem in the USA and abroad. For three consecutive summers, he was selected to conduct public concerts of the B-Minor Mass, St. Matthew Passion, and the Christmas Oratorio at the Oregon Bach Festival.

Bogza is responsible for a number of successful collaborations and is regarded for his sensitive approach. In 2017, he engaged an award-winning choreographer, Roger Van Fleteren, to present an abridged version of Prokofiev's ballet Romeo and Juliet and the fruitful relationship led to future projects with The Alabama Ballet. That same year, Bogza conducted two sold-out performances of The Moscow Ballet's The Great Russian Nutcracker, a production that included the company's professional dancers, 120 community dancers, and a local children's chorus. In 2018, in collaboration with Millikin University's School of Theatre and Dance, Bogza led three sold-out performances of The Phantom of the Opera and productions of Pirates of Penzance, Menotti's The Medium, and Barber's A Hand of Bridge. At the University of Minnesota, he led the workshop premiere of two operas, Sister Carrie and Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead, by Grammy-winning composer Robert Aldridge and assisted with productions of Così fan tutte, Falstaff, and Bartered Bride, among others.

Off the podium, Bogza is an endurance athlete who regularly competes in ultra-marathons and long-distance bike rides. Having won gold medals and finished over a dozen races, his future aspirations include competing for The Triple Crown and Badwater 135. Bogza trains with his two Belgian Malinois dogs, Samson and Stella, and is an avid chef of Slavic cuisine.



Panama City Symphony offers innovative, interactive music education programs to all ages to foster music appreciation, build confidence, and nurture talent.

Make Music Magic Kindergarten - 2nd Grade

Designed for our youngest audiences, Make Music Magic creates awareness and appreciation for the 'language' of music. This program guides students as they listen and share



their thoughts associated with a variety of music genres. The program includes interactive singing, clapping to various beats and melodies,

imaginative exercises, and discovering how music can express emotion and connect them to others.

Guest Artist Outreach & Masterclasses

In addition to being world-class performers, the Symphony's guest artists are educators and community

builders. Throughout the season, the Symphony's guest artists teach masterclasses in local high schools and colleges, perform for students, and play a vital role in the



community leading up to their concert appearance with



the Symphony. Artists perform recitals at Musically Up Close events, retirement communities, high schools and colleges.

Discovering Music 3rd Grade - 5th Grade

Featuring musician ensembles, Discovering Music helps students explore the 'ingredients' of music. To engage curious

young minds, the Panama City Symphony conductor and musicians demonstrate distinctive attributes of musical



instruments and convey how these unique attributes provide the 'recipe' for creating a full musical performance. Students actively listen to discover how music is built, observe individual instrument demonstrations, learn how melody connects the senses, and interactively learn through narrated stories.

Moments with the Maestro

Hosted by the Panama City Center for the Arts, the interactive lectures take place from 4:00-5:00 pm on the Friday before each Masterworks concert. The Maestro and guest artists share thoughts behind the selections, history of the composers and their works, and the nuances to listen for during the concert.

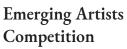

Panama City Symphony aims to inspire the next generation of musicians!

Panama City Symphony Mentoring Program

The Panama City Symphony's Mentoring Program places advanced musicians (9th grade and beyond) with a mentor who guides and serves as an intermediary between the conductor and the orchestra. Mentees shadow experienced musicians during rehearsals and concert performances, receiving high-level orchestral training in a nurturing and professional environment. Panama City Symphony often invites mentees to participate in community outreach performances. Since 2009, forty (40) students have been mentored representing homeschools, public and private high schools in Bay and Walton counties, and Gulf Coast State College. Taliah Bohlen will continue as a mentee in 2024-25.



The inaugural Emerging Artists Competition was held in June 2024 at Gulf Coast State College Amelia G. Tapper Center and will return bi-annually. Winners receive exciting cash prizes and awards and perform with various Panama City Symphony events and recitals in the year following a competitions. Judges were Maestro Sergey Bogza, Music Director and Conductor, Panama City Symphony; Dr. Gregory Jones, Associate Dean of Engagement, College of Music – FSU; and Erika Sciascia, Panama City Symphony Concertmaster. Sharing the stage as accompanists for the finalists at Panama City Symphony's **Emerging Artists Competition were** Valerie Trujillo and Mikayla Rogers.

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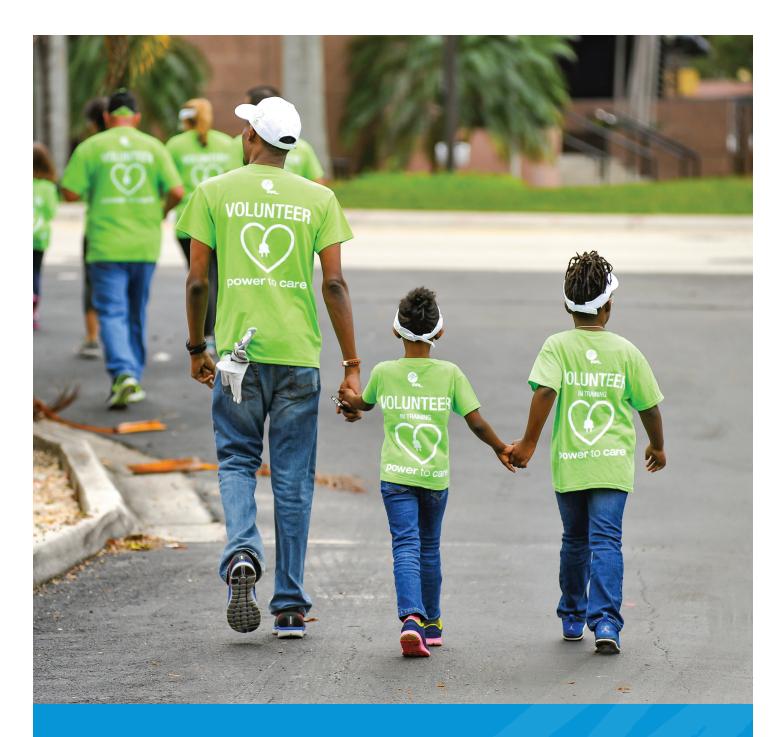

A GRAND BOHEMIAN CELEBRATION Program Notes

Johannes Brahms: Hungarian Dance No. 1 in G minor estimated duration: 3 minutes

Johannes Brahms' Hungarian Dance No. 1, composed in 1869 for piano four hands, exemplifies his skill in blending folk rhythms with classical sophistication. The piece opens with a lilting string melody that drives the tempo, while the upper woodwinds add playful embellishments. As the dance progresses, dynamic contrasts intensify, with quiet sections giving way to bold, vigorous passages. The work concludes with a spirited reprise of the opening theme and an exhilarating finale, capturing the vibrant essence of Bohemian folk music.

Antonín Dvořák: Slavonic Dance in A-flat major (Polka), Op. 46 & C major (Kola), Op. 72 estimated duration: 7 minutes

Antonín Dvořák's Slavonic Dance in A-flat major and Slavonic Dance in C major, Op. 72 are vibrant examples of his

ability to infuse classical music with the spirit of Eastern European folk traditions. Dvořák was one of the first among his countrymen to attain real international prominence as a composer, and this fame was catalyzed largely by the notoriety of the Slavonic Dances. Unlike Brahms' Hungarian ones, these do not incorporate actual folk melodies—all the tunes



are of the composer's invention, but the character is authentic enough to give the impression of lively atmosphere of village dances and celebrations.

The Slavonic Dance in A-flat major, Op. 46, is a lively Polka that reflects the rhythmic exuberance and playful character of



Bohemian folk dances. Its spirited tempo and engaging melodies are characterized by syncopated rhythms and bright, infectious energy, showcasing Dvořák's skill in blending folk elements with refined orchestral textures.

In contrast, the Slavonic Dance in C major, Op. 72, a dance known as a Kola, composed a few years later in 1886, presents a different flavor with its more expansive and lyrical character. The "Kola" (a term referring to a type of Bohemian folk dance) features a buoyant and energetic tempo, characterized by its playful and exuberant melodies. The piece opens with a vigorous, syncopated rhythm that immediately sets a vibrant tone. The orchestration is rich and colorful, with Dvořák employing dynamic contrasts and rhythmic patterns to enhance the dance's festive character.

Josef Suk: Meditation on the Old Bohemian Chorale (Svaty Vaclave), Op. 35a estimated duration: 7 minutes

Composed in 1914, Meditation on the Old Bohemian Chorale is a deeply reverent work that draws on the ancient Czech hymn associated with Saint Wenceslas, the patron saint of the Czech people. Composed in 1914 as Europe faced the turmoil of World War I, the piece expresses deep national pride and a yearning for peace. Suk's music, with its rich and solemn string writing, slowly reveals the chorale theme, building to a powerful emotional climax before gently receding. Originally for string quartet and later arranged for string orchestra, this work is cherished for its spiritual depth and its embodiment of Czech identity.

This performance will be preceded by the Svatý Václave Chorale, arranged for wind, brass, and percussion, by Allen Molineux.

Ludwig Minkus: Pas de deux from Don Quixote estimated duration: 6 minutes

Often performed as a stand-alone piece, Minkus's Pas de deux from Don Quixote is a cornerstone of classical ballet, renowned for its fiery spirit and technical challenges. Composed in 1869, the piece accompanies the ballet's romantic leads, Kitri and Basilio, in a dazzling display of virtuosity. The music brims with the vibrancy of Spain, featuring infectious melodies and dynamic rhythms that complement the choreography's blend of grace and athleticism.

Bedřich Smetana: Three Dances from Bartered Bride estimated duration: 13 minutes



Bedřich Smetana, a central figure in the development of Czech national music, composed The Bartered Bride in 1866. This opera, a comic tale of love and matchmaking in a rural Czech village, has become a symbol of Czech national identity. The Three Dances—the Polka, Furiant, and Dance of the Comedians—are some of the most

vibrant and popular sections from the opera, each capturing a different aspect of the lively village atmosphere.

The first of the three dances, the Polka, reflects the joyous and light-hearted spirit of the village festivities. The polka is a traditional Czech dance, and Smetana's version is filled with bright, catchy melodies and a buoyant rhythm that evoke the carefree nature of the villagers as they celebrate. Following the Polka, the Furiant is a more vigorous and rhythmically complex dance. Characterized by its rapid alternation of duple and triple meter, the Furiant embodies the fiery and spirited side of Czech folk traditions. This dance is full of energy and drive, showcasing Smetana's skill in crafting lively, syncopated rhythms that convey a sense of excitement and vigor.

The final dance, the Dance of the Comedians, is one of the most beloved and humorous parts of the opera. It accompanies the arrival of a traveling circus troupe in the village, adding a touch of playful whimsy to the proceedings. The music is filled with lively, playful melodies and quick, nimble rhythms, perfectly capturing the comedic antics of the circus performers and the joyful chaos they bring to the story.

Bedřich Smetana: The Moldau estimated duration: 12 minutes

Composed between 1874 and 1879, The Moldau, one of the most famous symphonic poems by Bedřich Smetana, is the second and most popular movement of his larger orchestral work Má Vlast (My Homeland). Smetana, often regarded as the father of Czech music, created Má Vlast as a musical tribute to the beauty, history, and legends of his homeland.

The Moldau vividly depicts the journey of the Vltava River, the longest river in the Czech Republic, as it flows through the countryside, passing forests, meadows, villages, and castles before reaching the city of Prague. The piece begins with the gentle murmuring of two small springs, represented by delicate flutes and clarinets. As the streams merge into a single river, the music swells, capturing the river's increasing strength and the grandeur of the Czech landscape.



Throughout the piece, Smetana incorporates folk-inspired melodies and rhythms that evoke scenes along the river's course. The music conveys a pastoral landscape with hunting horns, a rustic wedding with a lively polka, and the mystical dance of water nymphs under the moonlight. As the river approaches the capital, the music becomes majestic, symbolizing the pride and glory of the Czech nation. The symphonic poem concludes with a powerful and sweeping depiction of the river flowing through Prague, uniting the past and present in a grand, nationalistic tribute. Freddie Mercury: Bohemian Rhapsody for Orchestra and Solo Viola (arr. Nicholas Hersch) estimated duration: 7 minutes



Released by Queen in 1975 as the lead single from their fourth studio album, A Night at the Opera, Freddie Mercury's "Bohemian Rhapsody" is hailed as one of the most innovative and

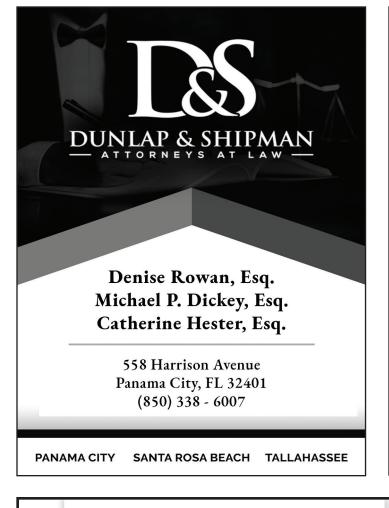
iconic rock songs ever recorded. Its unconventional structure and operatic style challenge traditional pop and rock norms by seamlessly blending rock, opera, and ballad elements into a groundbreaking composition. The song's unique fusion of genres, combined with its striking lyrics and dynamic changes, has cemented it as a timeless classic in music history.

Today's performance will feature a symphonic arrangement by the American conductor, arranger, and educator, Nicholas Hersch. Created in 2013, the arrangement became a viral YouTube hit and continues to be performed worldwide.

Jaromír Vejvoda: Beer Barrel Polka estimated duration: 3 minutes

Composed in 1927, the polka went through several stages before achieving widespread popularity. Initially performed as an instrumental piece, it first had lyrics added by Vašek Zeman in 1934, under the title "Škoda lásky" (Unrequited Love). Later, Shapiro Bernstein acquired the song, and Lew Brown and Wladimir Timm wrote English lyrics, originally framing it as a celebration of Prohibition's repeal. It wasn't until The Andrews Sisters recorded it in 1939 that the song gained widespread acclaim, leading to numerous covers by artists including the Glenn Miller Orchestra, Benny Goodman, Bobby Vinton, Billie Holiday, John Serry Sr., and Joe Patek, whose album "Beer Barrel Polka" sold over a million copies.
